

Level 3 Diploma in Veterinary Nursing- small animal pathway



Overview

In order to become a veterinary nurse, you must successfully complete a L3 Diploma in Veterinary Nursing from an approved Awarding Body (examination board). Abbeydale use Central Qualifications as our Awarding Body, who are a specialist examination board of veterinary and veterinary nursing qualifications.

Content

The Diploma in Veterinary Nursing -Small Animal aims to prepare and support students for a career in veterinary nursing.

The key purposes of the qualification are:

- To give students the ability to gain the knowledge and skills necessary to practice veterinary nursing, safely and competently.
- To allow students to grow as individuals and give them the chance to learn life skills essential for professional development.

The programme includes a balance of practice-based learning and theoretical teaching and use a variety of strategies to ensure students can undertake clinical tasks proficiently. Clinical placements in veterinary training practices will allow the acquisition of nursing skills and will enable students to become competent and confident in a veterinary environment.

The course is split up into two academic years and will focus on the following topics:

Year 1

- VN1 - Understanding the operational requirements of a veterinary practice
- VN2 - Professional relationships and communications for veterinary nursing practice
- VN3 - Comparative function and anatomy for veterinary nursing practice
- VN4 - Applied animal welfare, health and husbandry for veterinary nurses
- VN5 - Infection control in veterinary practice
- VN6 - Understanding the essentials of veterinary nursing care for hospitalised animals
- VN7 - Essentials of practical nursing care for hospitalised animals

Year 2

- VN8 - Supporting the supply of veterinary medicines
- VN9 - Veterinary nursing support of diagnostic imaging
- VN10 - Veterinary nursing support of laboratory diagnostics
- VN11 - Supporting veterinary operating theatre practice
- VN12 - Principles of supporting veterinary anaesthesia

- SAVN13 - Practical monitoring of small animal anaesthesia
- SAVN14 - Principals of peri-operative veterinary nursing support of small animals
- SAVN15 - Practical peri-operative veterinary nursing support for small animals
- SAVN16 - Principals of veterinary nursing support for sick animals
- SAVN17 - Practical veterinary nursing support of sick animals
- SAVN18 - Principals of small animal veterinary nursing emergency and critical care
- VN19 Preparing for professional registration

Entry

Students should have a minimum of five GCSEs (or equivalent), at grade 4-9 or C or above, which should include:

- English
- Mathematics
- A science subject (biology, chemistry or physics)

Students without these qualifications will be required to apply to Abbeydale for approval.

Evidence, testimonials and existing qualifications will be required to support the application. Abbeydale will judge each application on an individual basis and its decision is final.

Students must be employed in a veterinary practice that has been approved for training for the minimum of 15 hours per week in order to meet RCVS requirements.

Students must also be able to undertake the full range of tasks necessary to achieve this qualification.

Once an application has been received Abbeydale will contact you to arrange an informal interview date so you can come and meet the team, look around and hear more about the course.

No student will be subjected to unfair discrimination on the grounds of gender, sexual orientation, race, creed, age or special needs. Equal opportunity policies will be adhered to on all grounds.

Abbeydale expects all successful students to attend an induction day prior to the course starting. For key dates please see application information.

College attendance

At Abbeydale the VN Diploma is a 2-year day release course. Our intakes are every September, January and April each year (numbers depending). Your college day will either be a Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday depending on your start time, please contact us if you need more information.

The course has 715 guided learning hours which is a mixture of college and blended learning with access the Abbeydale Virtual Learning Environment for to access revision notes and practice questions.

In addition to this, the learner must spend a total of 1,800 hours in their training practice.

Assessment

Knowledge and understanding will be assessed by:

- Assignments set by Central Qualifications and marked by Abbeydale
- Multiple choice examinations (five papers in total) set and marked by Central Qualifications, these are held at Abbeydale.

Practical skills will be assessed by:

- An electronic work-based progress log (Central Skills Log)
- Practical examination of essential clinical skills (OSCE -Objective Structured Clinical Examination) set and administered by Central Qualifications, these are held at Abbeydale at the end of the course

Professional behaviours will be assessed by:

- Regular review with your clinical coach and Abbeydale against a criteria set in the Central Skills Log.

Level 2 Veterinary Nursing Assistant Diploma

Overview



The Veterinary Nursing Assistant Diploma is designed to give staff the confidence to support the qualified veterinary nurse and veterinary surgeon in the clinical setting. The course will enable them to develop an underpinning knowledge and basic nursing skills.

The course can allow for progression onto the Veterinary Nursing Diploma. Staff do not need to be employed in a registered Training Practice to undertake this qualification. This course is part time via supported study in college and distance learning.

The Veterinary Nursing Assistant Diploma will take one year to complete and is delivered by a unique blended learning approach utilising classroom taught sessions and a bespoke e-learning platform. Students will be required to attend college one day every six weeks for the duration of the course which helps the learner to develop a strong knowledge base enabling them to become an excellent nurse assistant. The college attendance days also provides excellent student support and learning, enabling students to progress better and have high achievement outcomes.

Alongside the theory component there is a strong emphasis on practical skills. The student will be required to either be employed in a veterinary practice or to undertake a clinical placement during their time studying the course to ensure that they cover the required clinical hours. During the clinical placement the student will be required to complete an online Central Skills Log (CSL) of clinical skills.

Please note that the practice does not need to be an RCVS accredited training practice.

The course is assessed by two formal examinations that the student will be required to pass which are taken at set stages during the course.

This qualification, in combination with a full level 2 qualification in Maths and English (e.g. GCSE Grade A*-C or Level 2 Functional Skills) will allow you to apply for the Level 3 Diploma in Veterinary Nursing, subject to employment in a veterinary practice that is approved to train veterinary nurses (a TP or aTP).

College attendance

The course is delivered by college attendance one day every six weeks and via our E-learning platform. The unique delivery of this blended learning approach allows us to provide taught sessions to students. Students progress better having regular contact with a tutor. We can keep help you progress better, address any learning needs and have a higher likelihood of success in the written examinations by providing structured class revision sessions.

Content

- VNA4 Principles and practices of animal handling and care in the veterinary environment
- VNA5 Principles of infection control for animal nursing assistants
- AN1 Principles of supporting veterinary nursing care for hospitalised animals

- VNA3 Companion Animal A&P
- VNA2 Principles and practices of administrative duties in the veterinary care environment
- VNA1 Maintain and develop personal performance
- AN2 Practical support of veterinary nursing care for hospitalised patients
- AN12 Practical animal nursing support of small animal patients

Entry

There are no formal academic entry requirements to study the Veterinary Nursing Assistant Diploma, but the following criteria must be achieved:

- Be employed within a veterinary practice or volunteering for a minimum of 10 hours per week for the full duration of the course
- Provide a reference from the employer supporting your application confirming that you are employed or have undertaken voluntary work prior to starting the programme
- Have a mentor within practice
- Be competent in reading, writing
- Complete a pre-course interview and attend a compulsory induction day

Assessment

Knowledge and understanding will be assessed by:

- Assignments set by Central Qualifications and marked by Abbeydale
- Multiple choice examinations (two papers in total) set and marked by Central Qualifications, these are held at Abbeydale

Practical skills will be assessed by:

- An electronic work-based progress log (Central Skills Log)

The Veterinary Nursing Assistant Diploma is a stand-alone qualification enabling successful candidates to work as a Veterinary Nurse Assistant. The L2 Veterinary Nursing Assistant Diploma alongside a L2 qualification in numeracy and literacy e.g. GCSE maths and English C grade or above (4-9)/Functional Skill Level 2 will allow entry to the L3 Veterinary Nursing Diploma.
